9 Day – 8 Night In-depth Discovery of Balinese Culture



Bali's very name beckons visitors as it conjures visions of its lively arts of dance, sculpture, painting, theater, leatherwork, metalworking and music. Eight regencies and the capital municipality reflect the island's nine traditional royal Balinese households that once ruled the Island. Breathtakingly beautiful terraced rice fields; intricate offerings lovingly

fashioned and abandoned on a daily basis to the gods; and ubiquitous ceremonies marking the passages of life - Bali is all this and more.

Home to the last outpost of an ancient Hindu Majapahit Empire that stretched across most of Southeast Asia, Bali's daily life on the Island is dominated by Bali's unique religion – Agama Hindu Dharma. Every Balinese village has at least three major temples that undergo a yearly anniversary requiring the participation and devotion of every member of the community. The tenets of Bali's core philosophy of *Tri Hita Karana* dictates that in all aspects of life a careful balance be maintained within the human community, in the community's relationships with the gods, and with the natural environment.

This one-of-a-kind in depth tour providing unique access to the people and the Island of Bali has been inspired by and created to support **BASAbali** – an organization representing a collaboration of scholars, artists, linguists and community members from within and outside Bali dedicated to safeguarding the Balinese language and island's culture. The result is a truly unique 9 days – 8 nights tour of Bali operating from November 24th – December 2, 2018, providing privileged access to some of the Island's most sacred sites, leading artists and artisans, language experts, community leaders, and cultural experts.

Desa Visesa Ubud



Serving as the base for this one-of-a-kind exploration of Bali is the equally unique Desa Visesa Ubud – an exquisite collection of 66 villas and 40 suites spread across a generous 6.5-hectare site. Owned and operated by Balinese, this culturally inspired resort captures the essence of a Balinese village on every level of the guest experience. Traditional

Informative lectures by local luminaries will provide otherwise unattainable insights on Balinese history, culture and language; including "hands-on" participative encounters with the Island's dance, art and music.

A portion of the cost of each tour will be donated to BASAbali's ongoing programs to engage the local and international communities in working together to develop a free, online, Balinese - English -Indonesian Wiki dictionary and cultural encyclopedia. The organization was just recognized internationally by being awarded the coveted Linguapax Award 2018 for its innovative language revitalization initiatives. This tour will end with ceremony celebrating presentation of the Linguapax Award.

The Itinerary

Day One – Saturday, November 24

Program commences with check in at the Desa Visesa Ubud. Transportation from the airport or another hotel in Bali is included in the program offering at no additional charge. A welcoming dinner and group briefing concludes with participants being adorned in traditional Balinese dress and transported to a colorful "odalan" ceremony celebrating the anniversary of a nearby temple. (Dinner)

Day Two – Sunday, November 25



The day starts with a hearty breakfast served on the edge of the Resort's working rice field. In keeping with the Balinese custom of seeking the Almighty's blessing on every enterprise, participants will visit *Tirta Empul Temple* (962 AD) to bathe in its sacred waters and be blessed by a priest followed by a visit to Gunung Kawi - a 10th century subak (rice irrigation

organization) garden temple in Sebatu. Lunch will be served at a local panoramic restaurant. An easy, nature walk on a largely-level patch led by a Balinese herbalist and healer who will explain the medicinal role of local plants, ending with a brief reflexology session provided by expert therapists. Evening lecture by acclaimed photographer Rio Helmi on 40 years of photographs taken in Bali. Dinner at the Resort or nearby restaurant. (Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner)

Day Three - Monday, November 26



Breakfast at the Resort. Guided tour of the busy local market in Ubud. Stop at Kerta Gosa – the Hall of Justice built in late 17th century showing the just desserts (Karma Pala) awaiting criminals and wrongdoers. Then, a short visit at the textile market of Semarapura. After a short road trip, participants will be welcomed by a village elder who will grant access to the village of Tenganan

Pegringsingan – a walled community home to a Bali Aga (aboriginal)





society considered by anthropologists to back to the 10th Distinctively different in its customs. traditions and construction - Tenganan is also where the much prized "double ikat" arinasina and selondina aamelan musical forms can be found. Villagers will host participants to a delicious traditional lunch. Dinner in Ubud at Locavore - a restaurant ranked among Asia's "Top 50". (Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner)

Day Four – Tuesday, November 27



Breakfast at the Resort. A day of cultural immersion operated from our Ubud base. Lontar leaf manuscripts in Bali have served as the way of recording history, literature and folklore for more than a millennium. Vice Dean of the Faculty of Letters and Culture at Udayana University, Chair of Udayana's Lontar Library, and head of **BASAbali**'s expert linguist team, I

Gde Nala Antara, along with his protégé and head of **BASAbali**'s graduate students' linguist team, Putu Eka Guna Yasa, will spend the morning explaining the history of lontar leaf writing in Bali and lead participants in a writing workshop on traditional Balinese script. Participants will take home their own lontar inscribed with their names in Balinese script. This will be followed by a separate entertaining lecture on speaking Balinese by Rucina Ballinger - an American woman and long-time Bali resident who leads a musical-comedy troupe that performs solely in Basa Bali. A simple Nasi Campur lunch at a popular Ubud eatery will round out the morning. Afternoon free. Evening dinner lecture by highly regarded author, journalist and essayist I Wayan Juniartha, speaking on Bali in the Age of Globalization. (Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner)


Day Five – Wednesday, November 28



Breakfast at the Resort. The day is dedicated to the exploration of Balinese arts and crafts, including visits to the workshop and gallery of renowned maskmaker IB Alit and a tour of Nyana Tilem Wood Carving Gallery and Museum. For lunch, traditional "Balinese Crispy Duck" at Tepi Sawah Restaurant, followed by a tour of ARMA Museum. An evening lecture on Women in Modern Bali

by Kadek Sonia Piscayanti, lecturer at Ganesha University. Dinner at *Nusantara Restaurant* where classic Indonesian dishes from all over the archipelago are celebrated by chefs who combine the freshest of local, seasonal components and ethical meats in nuanced artisanal recipes. (Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner)

Day Six – Thursday, November 29







Breakfast at the Resort. A day dedicated to Balinese wayang shadow puppetry, dance, and musical theater. The day includes a visit to Sanggar Paripurna – an community arts in Bali led by internationally acclaimed artist Made Sidia and lunch with a group of young performance artists. There's also a backstage tour of the Bali Agung Performance, Bali's longest running stage show led by the show's producer and host for the day - Made Sidia, followed by VIP seating at the show. Dinner at the private residence of the head of the renowned ARMA museum, Anak Aguna Gede Rai, including a private tour of the compound explaining the "Kosala Kosali" spatial rules governing the creation of Balinese living space. Special performance of Kobagi (Community of Crazy Bodies) a dance group uniquely presentina "genjak" and "kecak" performances using diverse parts of the bamboo and as musical instruments. (Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner)

Day Seven – Friday, November 30



Breakfast at the Resort. Lecture by Wiwik Dharmiasih on Bali's ancient "subak" water management system. Trip to UNESCO World Heritage Site of Jatiluwih Rice Terraces and Batukaru Temple. Panoramic lunch. Dinner and Balinese Dance Performance at the Peliatan Royal Palace near Ubud. (Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner)

Day Eight – Saturday, December 01





Breakfast at the Resort. Included spa treatment Desa Visesa at Afternoon and lunch at participant's discretion. Kecak Workshop led by Prof. I Wayan Dibia of the Bali Arts Institute. Closina Dinner at ARMA Museum including Linguapax Award presentation for 2018 to BASAbali. Gala farewell performance of Wayang Listrik Sanggar Paripurna under the direction of Maestro Made Sidia. (Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner)

Day Nine – Sunday, December 02

Breakfast at the Resort. Program concludes with 12 noon check out from hotel. Transfer to Airport or a new hotel in Bali included in the tour program.

Lecturers, Highlights and Tour Assistants

Rucina Ballinger

Long-term resident of Bali, Rucina was the director of World Learning's Academic Semester Abroad, Elderhostel's cultural program and currently is working in the non profit sector. Founder of the comedy group, Gedebong Goyang, Rucina lives by the adage "laugh at least once a day". She is the mother of two grown bicultural, trilingual men and grandmother of two, former banjar head, she accompanied President Obama and his family during their visit to Bali in June 2017.

Rio Helmi

Born to an Indonesian diplomat father and Turkish mother, Rio Helmi is an Indonesian photographer and writer whose work fills more than 20 large format photographic books. His photography has been exhibited in Bali, Jakarta, Madrid, Miyazaki, Palo Alto, San Francisco, and Sydney and also form part of private collections in London, San Francisco, Rome, Boston, Washington, and Tokyo.

A resident of Bali since the 1970s, Rio is fluent in five languages. His professional work focuses on the interactions between indigenous peoples and their environment. As a result, he has traveled extensively across the Indonesian archipelago and across Asia to Malaysia, Myanmar, Thailand, Japan, Ladakh and Mongolia photographing both remote tribal people and urban life.

Made Westi

A descendent from a family of Balinese healers, Made Westi, together with his wife, Ni Wayan Lilir, gather traditional Balinese herbal medicines from the rural areas and jungles of the Island that they share with the larger community based on the ancient Balinese book of healing – *Usada Bali*. Made will share his wide botanical and natural healing knowledge via a botanical walk.

I Wayan Juniartha

A journalist and social commentator who finds Bali and its many contradictions a constant source of amusement. He finds solace in crafting essays following his tragically failed attempt at writing poetry. His first and probably last book, Bungklang-Bungkling, records the hilarity and ludicrousness of Balinese men. When he is not writing essays, "Jun" can be found pedaling towards the island's most serene spots while composing bite-size poems. which YOU can seek with the #cyclingwithbuddha. He is one of the editors of the English newspaper Jakarta Post and is the Indonesian Program Manager for the annual Ubud Writers and Readers Festival.

Ida Bagus Alit, Mask Maker

Alit, age 64, has been carving wood and masks since he was a school boy, studying with his grandfather. He makes masks and god images for Balinese temples, masks for dancers and performs *Topeng Sidhakarya* mask dance at rituals. He is in high demand by some of Bali's top performers to create both traditional and new masks.

Anak Agung Gede Rai

Anak Agung Gede Rai is an art collector and promoter extraordinaire of Balinese culture. Born into poverty, he used to take rolled up paintings down to sell in Kuta. He now owns and operates the ARMA Museum and

ARMA Resort, providing free classes in traditional dance, music and painting to the children in surrounding areas and producing numerous events every year for the local and international community.

I Gde Nala Antara

Vice-Dean of the Faculty of Letters and Culture at Udayana University, the head of the Balinese Governor's Language Board (Badan Pembina Bahasa Aksara dan Sastra Bali Provinsi Bali) and serves as the head of the expert team of the online Balinese-Indonesian-English Wiki Dictionary created by BASAbali. Antara will also head the new local foundation BASAbali Wiki.

Kobagi (Community of Crazy Bodies)

Kobagi was founded in 2008 by a group of 15 performers, including the late Greg Gensse. It is a blend of *genjek* (a form of song and movement), *kecak* (interlocking vocalities) and body music. There is nothing else like it on the island. Their infectious energy and joy will have you stomping in your seats.

Made Sidia and Sanggar Paripurna

One of Bali's most acclaimed wayang puppeteers and director of gala cultural-theatrical shows. Made Sidia is a faculty director of the *Indonesian Art Institute* and director-founder of the *Sanggar Paripurna* – a private campus dedicated to fostering Balinese dance, theater and music. Togther with Australian Peter Wilson, he created Bali's longest running daily stage show at the *Bali Agung Theatre* featuring more than 200 performers.

Wiwik Dharmiasih

A Lecturer at the Department of International Relation, *Udayana University*. Wiwik Dharmiasih was instrumental in helping to establish Jatiluwih Subak as an UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Professor I Wayan Dibia

A professor of theatre at *ISI*, the Indonesian Arts Institute in Denpasar. Professor I Wayan Dibia was born into a family of dancers and musicians. He has carried on the family tradition both in performance and as a field of academic study. He has written numerous books on the arts in Bali (one of which is *Balinese*, *Dance*, *Drama and Music* - co-authored with Rucina Ballinger), lectures and performs around the world and is renown as the foremost expert on *kecak*.

Wayang Listrik

Wayang Listrik is a form of shadow puppet originally created by Larry Reed of San Francisco. Replacing the traditional oil lamp with electric lamps has made It possible to create different sized images projected on a giant screen. In 2002, Wayan Sidia developed a theater form called

Wayang Skateboard that uses a large screen to accommodate the shadows of six puppeteers moving on skateboards. The music that accompanies this form of Wayang Listrik utilizes traditional Balinese gamelan instruments, percussion instruments from Africa, and a keyboard and bass guitar. This stupendous show will be especially staged for our visitors and will be presented in both English and Balinese
